Firearms are still the number one weapon of choice, however. Since the Columbine High School massacre in 1999, there has been a paradigm shift in how law enforcement AND civilians respond to active shooter events and how we now work together to minimize casualties. Beginning with an overview of legal analysis (i.e. what lawyers do) by delving into a common law case (something the students will be asked to read) that illustrates the role of precedent as well as how the common law develops over time, the class will explore how the United States Supreme Court became a co-equal branch of government and dominant over state courts in the early 19th century. We will then go on to highlight landmark decisions that shed light on fundamental issues in United States history.

The Supreme Court played, and continues to play, a major role in historical, social, and cultural issues such as reproduction, marriage, and housing. The Court ruled on issues of sectionalism and slavery, playing a crucial role as an underlying cause of the Civil War. The Court became a roadblock to the establishment of the modern welfare state, and it was/is instrumental in defining the roles of women, African Americans, and Native Americans, for example.

A major theme of the class that underlines the role of the Supreme Court (or any appellate-level court) in American History is whether courts <u>find</u> law or <u>make</u> law?
